## A MESSAGE FROM THE DEAN

### BUILDING ON A FOUNDATION



As I contemplated a move from the relative security of a professorship into the Office of Dean, I was thankful that the accomplishments of my predecessors, most recently Dean Mary Wright, have provided a foundation for the School of Law's progress in the coming years.

The North Carolina Central University School of Law continues to have one of the most diverse student bodies in the nation. Our faculty's commitment to teaching and public service has not faltered. Our criminal, civil rights and civil litigation clinics continue to serve our students and the public with distinction.

We are exploring areas that will enhance our educational offerings. One possibility is a joint JD-MBA degree program with the School of Business and another is a faculty-student exchange with one or more foreign law schools. We are in the early exploration phase of these educational programs which we hope will enrich our students' legal education and enhance their placement opportunities. A Family Law Clinic is in the planning stage.

We have enjoyed a significant increase in law school applications from prospective students in recent years. For this Fall's entering class, we received over 1700 applications for 90 places in the Day Program and 30 places in the Evening Program. We only offered admission to approximately 200 persons to enroll 120 students.

The establishment of a \$1 million endowment for the Charles Hamilton Houston Chair by former School of Law Professor Susie Powell and Franklin Anderson, who is her husband and a NCCU Trustee, will bring a nationally recognized professor to the School of Law in the area of Constitutional Law and Civil Rights. The recruitment of a renowned faculty member to serve alongside the distinguished faculty currently at the School of Law will not only strengthen our educational program but will focus national attention on the School of Law and the entire University.

During the 1994-95 academic year, as I learn the meaning of "collapsing budgets" and "disappearing funds," my priorities are to meet with alumni and friends and to work with the Alumni Association to improve the financial well being of the School of Law.

Private support by alumni and friends is crucial to our School of Law's continued success. This year the Alumni Association, under the leadership of President Grady Jessup, will sponsor the Annual Fund Campaign and plans to establish a School of Law Foundation to manage contributions to the Alumni Association and to ensure that investments are as safe and productive as possible. These funds will be used to support the library, student activities, alumni reunions, special lectures, and scholarships at the School of Law.

Our strength as a law school is directly dependent on the success of our graduates. We must support each other economically and politically. I challenge our alumni to join the Alumni Association and increase their financial contributions to the North Carolina Central University School of Law as we build on our foundation in the years ahead.

### DEAN LUNEY PICKS ADMINISTRATIVE TEAM

Dean Percy R. Luney, Jr. has named his administration for the North Carolina Central University School of Law. Serving as Associate Deans will be Mark W. Morris and Charles E. Smith. Serving as Assistant Deans are Sandra Polin and Adrienne Lea Meddock.

Morris will serve as the Associate Dean for Academic Affairs. Morris received his AB from UNC at Chapel Hill, his J.D. *summa cum laude* from NCCU and his Master of Laws from the Harvard Law School. He is the coauthor of *North Carolina Law of Torts* and has taught at the School of Law since 1984.

Smith will serve as the Associate Dean for Student Affairs. Smith received his B.S. from California Polytechnic University, his J.D. from Georgetown University and his Master of Laws from Duke University. Smith is admitted to practice before the Patent bar and has been a professor at the School of Law for 15 years.

Polin is serving her second year as the Assistant Dean for the Day Program. She received her B.A. *cum laude* from Williams College and her J.D. from the University of Toledo. This is her third year with the School of Law.

Meddock is serving as the Assistant Dean for the Evening Program. She received her A.B. from UNC Chapel Hill and her J.D. *summa cum laude* from NCCU. She has taught at the School of Law since 1991.

### SCHOOL OF LAW TO PUBLISH FIRST ALUMNI MAGAZINE

## FACULTY

### PROFESSOR HONORED FOR HER WORK ON BEHALF OF WOMEN'S REPRODUCTIVE HEALTH

Professor Cheryl Amana recently received the Torchbearer's and Trailblazer's Award from the N.C. Equity Women of Color Program. Awards were given at the program's Conference on The State of Our Health: Empowering to Mobilize for Action held in Fayetteville, September 30-October 1st. Professor Amana was recognized for her work on behalf of women's reproductive health. She is also active with issues concerning adolescent parents, as well as those affecting abused and neglected children. She recently established the Adolescent Parenting Scholarship at NCCU, which provides tuition for graduates of the State Adolescent Parenting Project who attend NCCU. She has been the coordinator from NCCU for the Joint Center on Child Advocacy and Protection, a project currently being developed by NCCU, Duke, and UNC-CH to deal with research and services that impact families in crisis based on abuse or neglect. She teaches Family Law and a seminar in BioEthics at the School of Law.

### EARNHARDT TO RETURN FROM PRODUCTIVE LEAVE OF ABSENCE

Professor Tom Earnhardt will be returning to the School of Law Faculty in Spring 1995 after an eighteen-month leave of absence. Earnhardt, who teaches Environmental Law, Property, and Business Associations, has been using his expertise in those areas as the Executive Director of the 50,000 member North Carolina Wildlife Federation.

## FOCUS ON FACULTY

**Professor James Beckwith** has been chosen to revise the Agency and Partnership materials for the BAR-BRI North Carolina materials. He teaches Agency/Partnership, Contracts and Consumer Protection in the Evening and Sales & Secured Transactions in the Day and Evening Programs.

**Professor Marilyn Bowens** has published "The 'Cleaver

Paradigm' as an Anachronism in a Multi-cultural Society" in the Wisconsin Women's Law Journal. She teaches Constitutional Law in the Day and Evening Programs this year.

**Professor Adrienne Fox** has two publications out in 1994. The second edition of *Admissibility of Evidence in North Carolina* has been released by Harrison. Out for the first time is *North Carolina Rules of Evidence with Objections*, published by the National Institute for Trial Advocacy, which she coauthored with Professors Bocchino and Sonenshein of the Temple Law School. She teaches Evidence, Trial Practice, and Civil Procedure. Look for information on Professor Fox's teaching trial advocacy methodology to Russian law professors in the upcoming alumni magazine.

**Adjunct Professor Nicholas Herman** will publish *A Practical System for Legal Research* in the next NCCU School of Law Journal. He teaches Appellate Advocacy and writing courses in the Evening Program and is a partner in Bernholz & Herman in Chapel Hill.

**Paul L. Jones**, supervising attorney for the Civil Rights Litigation Clinic, was reappointed for a second term to the Disciplinary Hearing Commission for the North Carolina State Bar. He was a presenter at the October NC Association of Black Lawyers Professional Responsibility CLE on the topic "A View from the Disciplinary Hearing Commission Bench."

**Professor Irving Joyner** spoke at both the October NC Association of Black Lawyers Professional Responsibility CLE and most recently at a November meeting of the B'nai B'rith on the state of Civil Rights co-operation between the African-American and Jewish communities. He serves on several statewide commissions. He has worked on the NCCU campus coordinating a series of Drug Education and Prevention workshops for athletes and serves on the Chancellor's search committee for a new athletic director.

**Law Librarian Deborah Mayo-Jefferies** has published two books with Hein & Co. in 1994: *Religious Freedom in the Education Process: A Research Guide to Religion in Education and Equal Educational Opportunity For All Children: A Research Guide to Discrimination in Education*. She teaches Legal Bibliography.

**Assistant Dean for the Evening Adrienne Meddock** has lectured to artists and songwriters on legal issues in Charlotte and Hickory this fall as part of her work as the co-chair of the NC Bar Association's Lawyers and the Arts Committee, the largest committee in the Young Lawyers Division. She also serves on the Board of the NC Volunteer Lawyers for the Arts.

She was selected as a Marshal for the North Carolina Bar Center dedication, where she served as an escort for Chief Justice Rehnquist. She teaches legal writing and Entertainment Law.

**Associate Dean Mark Morris** has published *Tort Liability: A Manual for NC Local Governments* (IRTE 1994). He also conducted a mediation training session for employees of the University as part of the campus's sexual harassment policy implementation. He teaches Torts, Employment Law, and Remedies.

**Professor Mary Wright** has returned to the classroom full-time and is working on a book on North Carolina Family Law for the Harrison Company. She teaches Contracts and Legal Method.

**Professor Walter Nunnallee** has been speaking at numerous educational programs for both lawyers and CPA's on the topic on "S" corporations. He has been named most effective speaker at several symposia. He teaches Basic, Estate & Gift, Advanced, and Business Entity taxation courses at the School.

## STUDENTS

### STUDENT INTERNS FOR DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE

Durham native Tyler S. Pokrass completed a summer internship at the United States Department of Justice in Washington, D.C. Pokrass, who entered his second year at North Carolina Central University School of Law, helped handle civil rights issues in the office of Public Affairs. In addition to drafting press releases and helping to write speeches for Department officials, Pokrass assisted in the production of a national public service campaign to inform citizens about the Americans with Disabilities Act. The campaign includes a radio spot and four television spots, in which he appears. Pokrass is interested in pursuing a career in mediation.

### STUDENTS PARTICIPATE IN LAW ENFORCEMENT TRAINING VIDEO

Members of NCCU's Trial Advocacy Board participated in the making of a training video to be used statewide in the Basic Law Enforcement Training (BLET) Academy. The video, on law enforcement ethics and professionalism, was put together by Captain L.V. Zastrow of the Durham County Sheriff's Department. It features different scenarios illustrating improper examples of law enforcement conduct, in an effort to stimulate class discussion on the mistakes made by the officers. One of the training scenarios shows a law enforcement officer in court, testifying on the witness stand. To make the scene as realistic as possible, Captain Zastrow enlisted the help of NCCU law students Jannika Cannon and Lamar Frasier to act as the defense attorney and prosecutor. Ms. Cannon and Mr. Frasier are second year law students at NCCU, and active members of the school's Trial Advocacy Board. The Trial Advocacy Board's Faculty advisor, Visiting Assistant Professor Grady Jessup, also participated in the courtroom scene, portraying the role of Judge. Starting in January 1995, this video will be a mandatory part of the Basic Law Enforcement Training instruction given to all new officers. The Trial Advocacy Board will compete in several competitions this spring.

### CAROL WILSON CALDWELL MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIPS AWARDED

The Board of Directors of the Carol Wilson Caldwell Memorial Legal Scholarship has announced its awards for this year. Vershenia Ballance and Amanda Green, both third year students at North Carolina Central University School of Law, have been selected as the 1994 recipients of the Caldwell Scholarship.

Ms. Ballance, a native of Windsor, North Carolina, graduated from Bertie High School and the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. Ms. Green, a native of Jacksonville, North Carolina, graduated from Jacksonville Senior High School and Meredith College.

The Scholarship honors Carol Wilson Caldwell, a native of Parmele, North Carolina. Ms. Caldwell was a dedicated attorney who practiced in Williamston and Tarboro. She was a prominent and frequent speaker who was devoted to issues affecting black women and her community. She died in 1976 at the age of 30, leaving a daughter, Gabriella, and her husband, John T. Caldwell.

### WOMEN'S CAUCUS CONTINUES TO PURSUE AN ACTIVE AGENDA

This fall, the Women's Caucus sponsored several activities and events for the entire student body of the School of Law. Early in the semester, the group worked with other student groups to clean up the student activities office. The Caucus also keeps the school community informed by maintaining a bulletin board in the student lounge and posting items of interest concerning women in the legal profession. The Caucus sells coffee and NCCU School of Law mugs each Thursday. In October, the Caucus recognized Breast Cancer Awareness Month and distributed prevention literature, including a shower self-examination instruction card for both women (breast cancer) and men (testicular cancer). Member Heidi Stewart traveled to Asheville for the North Carolina Association of Women Attorneys Annual Meeting. Some members worked on the campaign to re-elect Judge Betsy McCradden, currently the only woman on the North Carolina Court of Appeals.

The Caucus worked with several members of the faculty to prepare a course on Women and the Law, which will be offered in Spring 1995. The Caucus will sponsor and plan a day-long CLE on issues concerning women and the law in North Carolina. Other upcoming events include an AIDS awareness day, a mock trial on the issue of sexual harassment, a "Day at Law School" for women high school students, NCCU undergrads, and others interested in the legal profession.

### TRADEMARK MOOT COURT BOARD TO COMPETE

Five students are preparing to compete in the Saul Lefkowitz Memorial Moot Court Competition this February in Atlanta. The competition is sponsored by the Brand Names Education Foundation to encourage law students to learn more about issues in this rapidly growing field. This year's issue focuses on high fashion knock offs and trademark parody. The team members are, from the Day Program, Joe Seagle 2L and Freddie Lane 3L, and from the Evening Program, Kathy Egan 4LE, Susan Mitchell 2LE, and Scott Reid 4LE. Interested alumni are encouraged to help the team prepare in a series of practice arguments to be held in early February. The team is advised by Associate Dean Charles Smith, who teaches Patent Law, and Assistant Dean Meddock, who teaches Entertainment Law.

Ms. Baker distinguished herself through her work with Future Attorneys Challenging Elementary Students (FACES). While a full-time law student, Ms. Baker lead a group of fellow students in periodic visits with elementary students in the Durham school system to encourage and aid them in their studies. The State Bar annually recognizes and honors student from each of the state's law schools who has been active in public service.

### **SCHOOL SELECTED FOR SPECIAL MEDIATION TRAINING**

On September 24, 1994, North Carolina Central University School of Law offered a program taught by Administrative Office of the Courts certified trainers that fulfilled the requirements of a new AOC rule. Recent revisions to the North Carolina Supreme Court's Rules Governing Mediated Settlement Conferences in Superior Court Civil Actions permit certification of non-attorney mediators upon completion of a 6-hour training program in North Carolina legal terminology, civil court procedure, mediator ethics, and confidentiality.

The Program was directed by Associate Dean Mark W. Morris, who is also a certified mediator. Other faculty

members participating were Frances P. Solari and Thomas M. Ringer. Alumna Janet W. Brown '85 also presented at the program. She is an attorney and certified mediator from Durham and one of the first people in the state to be certified in the Superior Court Pilot Program. The Program was well received and is the only such program to have been approved in the state.

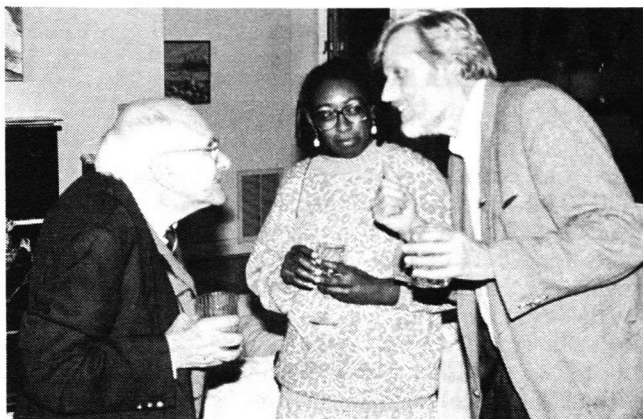

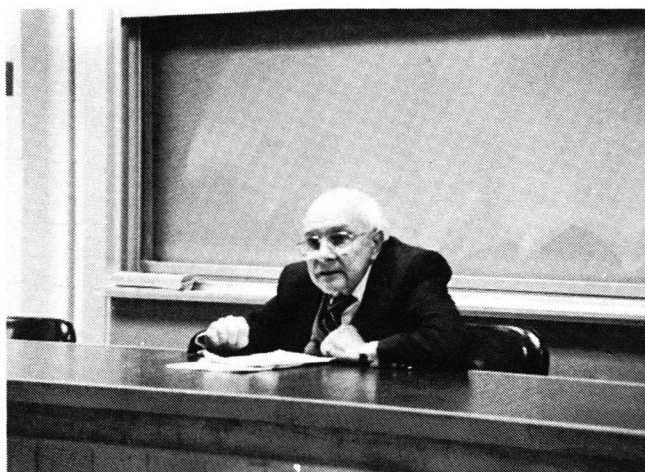
## ALUMNI HELP FUND VISIT BY CIVIL RIGHTS ACTIVIST

Professor Arthur Kinoy, Distinguished Professor of Constitutional Law at Rutgers University School of Law, visited NCCU School of Law in November of 1993. Professor Kinoy, a 1947 graduate of Columbia University School of Law, is a cofounder of the National Center for Constitutional Law. After law school, he immediately became engaged in the practice of civil rights law. He has represented scores of civil rights advocates and labor activists and played a significant role in shaping the law during the civil rights movement. Professor Kinoy has represented such renowned clients as Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., Julius and Ethel Rosenberg, and the Chicago Seven. He changed the nature of civil rights lawyering by reviving unused reconstruction statutes to challenge racism and discrimination. Professor Kinoy joined the faculty at Rutgers in 1964 with tenure. He has published a book about his efforts to protect civil rights entitled *Rights on Trial*.

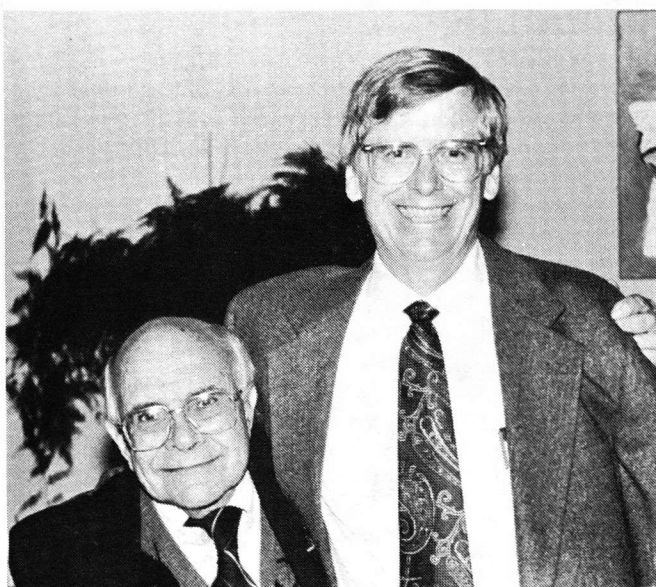
During his visit to the School of Law, Professor Kinoy presented two lectures, "Shaw v. Reno: The Issue of Congressional Redistricting" and "Current Constitutional Issues in Education." These lectures were open to faculty, staff, students, and members of the public and were followed by receptions. He also visited several classes including Professor Bowens's Constitutional Law class, where he lectured on First Amendment issues, Professor Joyner's Criminal Procedure class, where he lectured on maximizing constitutional protections for individuals, and Paul Jones's class on civil rights, where he talked about the formation and operation of the Center for Constitutional Rights. Professor Kinoy led a faculty colloquium entitled "The Role of Public Interest Lawyers in Today's Society and the Law School's Role in Preparing and Educating Them," and ended his visit by attending a reception at the home of Professor Adrienne Fox, where he met faculty members from Duke and UNC law schools as well as members of NCCU School of Law's faculty. His visit was made possible by a gift from the NCCU School of Law Alumni Association.

## SCHOOL HOSTS ACLU "TEACH-IN" FOR HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS

On October 18, 1994, the Durham Chapter of the American Civil Liberties Union sponsored a "Teach-In" for area high-school students. This event was held at the School of Law, and included addresses by Superior Court Judge Orlando Hudson, who spoke to the students on how to conduct a trial, Professor Cheryl Amana, who spoke on "Divorcing Your Parents" and Professor Marilyn Bowens, who discussed "Alternative Family Structures." Students also participated in small group discussions and a mock court trial. A number of attorneys, School of Law professors, and community leaders volunteered their time to participate in the program. The program is funded by the Durham Chapter of the ACLU and by the Paul Green Foundation and was coordinated at the school by Professor Renee Hill.

## CHANCELLOR SPEAKS ON PROFESSIONALISM IN THE LEGAL PROFESSION

North Carolina Central University Chancellor Julius Chambers spoke at the School of Law on Wednesday, September 7, 1994, on the importance of Professionalism for Lawyers. Julius Chambers, a distinguished Civil Rights attorney and a member of the School of Law Faculty, is the former Director-Counsel for the NAACP Defense & Education Fund. On January 1, 1993, Chambers took over as Chancellor of North Carolina Central University.
