Privately Funded Scholarship Endowments at North Carolina Central University School of Law

What are privately funded scholarship endowments?

Each year, alumni and friends, law firms, community and national organizations, and local businesses give to Law School scholarship endowments. Donors give to established named scholarship endowments or with a required minimum gift, create new named scholarship endowments. Also, donors give to the Law School's general scholarship endowment. Since government funds are not included, these funds are considered privately funded scholarship endowments.

Why are privately funded scholarship endowments important to the Law School?

Although a limited amount of financial aid is available to students through the state and federal government, privately funded scholarships provide the Law School with critical financial resources that allow us to:

- provide an opportunity to capable and deserving students—first generation college students, single parents, students with families—who might not otherwise be able to go to law school;
- attract talented students who add value to the legacy of the Law School and to the communities in which they eventually serve;
- help recent graduates reduce the financial debt that law school brings, allowing them to consider positions in the public sector.

How are scholarship endowment monies disbursed?

Only the income generated from scholarship endowments is used for scholarship awards. Most endowments yield approximately 5% in earnings each year.

How are gifts made to existing named endowments?

The Law School currently has 12 named scholarship endowments. Donors may designate their gift to the named scholarship endowment of their choice. ***Checks are payable to the NCCU Foundation, Inc. and the name of the scholarship endowment must be written on the memo section of the check.*** Gifts may also be made by credit card. NOTE: There is not a minimum gift amount for gifts to these existing named scholarship endowments.

How are gifts made to the general scholarship endowment fund?

The NCCU Law School Scholarship Endowment was established as a general scholarship endowment fund. Gifts to this endowment:

- do not require a minimum gift;
- provide the Law School with a guaranteed annual award each academic year, even if no gifts are made during that year as long as there is a minimum balance of \$50,000;
- may be given in honor of or in memory of a family member, friend, or organization.

Checks are payable to the NCCU Foundation, Inc. and Law School Scholarship Endowment must be written on the memo section of the check. Gifts may also be made by credit card.

How are named scholarship endowments created?

In 1999, the Law School adopted a new named scholarship endowment policy to ensure that adequate funds are generated for scholarship awards. The creation of a named scholarship endowment:

- requires a minimum gift of \$50,000;
- provides the Law School with a guaranteed annual award each academic year, even if no gifts are made during that year as long as there is a minimum balance of \$50,000;
- remains, as named, for the life of the Law School;
- is promoted in Law School communication materials.

Prior to 1999, there was not an established minimum gift to create a scholarship endowment. If the balance within a previously established named endowment does not meet the \$50,000 minimum balance, a yearly award may not be made to allow endowment earnings to increase for a future scholarship award. More information on creating a named scholarship endowment is available through the Office of Development Affairs.

When are scholarship awards made to students? Scholarships are awarded in the fall semester of each academic year.

What are the criteria for selecting students to receive privately funded scholarships?

For currently established scholarships, candidates must be enrolled full-time at NCCU School of Law and demonstrate financial need. If the candidate is a second, third or fourth year student, he/she must have a GPA of 2.5 or higher. If the candidate is an entering first year student the selection process is based on the predictive index (i.e. a combination of the student's undergraduate GPA and LSAT). *When establishing a new scholarship endowment, a donor may require different or additional criteria.*

What is the cost of a full tuition and fee scholarship award?

For the 2003-2004 academic year, the Law School's annual tuition and fees total \$3,585 for in-state and \$15,370 for out-of-state.

ALBERT L. TURNER SCHOLARSHIP ENDOWMENT

The Albert L. Turner Scholarship was established in honor of the second and first full-time NCCU Law School Dean, the late Albert L. Turner. Dean Turner served the Law School from 1942-1965, having the distinction as the longest serving Dean in the history of the Law School.



DANIEL G. SAMPSON SCHOLARSHIP ENDOWMENT

The Daniel G. Sampson Scholarship was established in honor of the third NCCU Law School Dean, the late Daniel G. Sampson. Dean Sampson served the Law School from 1965-1969, having the distinction of adeptly responding to proponents who called for the closing of the Law School.



HARRY E. GROVES SCHOLARSHIP ENDOWMENT

The Harry E. Groves Scholarship was established in honor of the fifth NCCU Law School Dean, Harry E. Groves. Dean Groves served the Law School from 1976-1981, having the distinction of launching the Law School's four-year part-time evening program.



CLIFTON E. JOHNSON '67 SCHOLARSHIP ENDOWMENT

The Clifton E. Johnson Scholarship was established in honor of Clifton E. Johnson, former Judge on the North Carolina Court of Appeals and 1967 alumnus of NCCU Law School. Judge Johnson served on the Court of Appeals from 1982-1997. *2003 Recipients: Clifton Gray Class of 2005 and Byron Dunning Class of 2005*



JULIAN PIERCE '76 SCHOLARSHIP ENDOWMENT

The Julian Pierce Scholarship was established in honor of the late Julian Pierce, former executive director of the Lumbee River Legal Services and political activist. Mr. Pierce, a 1976 NCCU Law School alumnus, worked with the Lumbee River Legal Services from 1978-1988, and ran in 1988 for a North Carolina Superior Court judgeship. *2003 Recipient: Joshua Malcolm Class of 2004*



JOHNNIE W. BROWN SCHOLARSHIP ENDOWMENT

The Johnnie W. Brown Scholarship was established in honor of the late Johnnie W. Brown, former employee of NCCU Law School. Ms. Brown served as NCCU Law School administrative assistant and registrar for 23 years, from 1970-1993. *2003 Recipients: Raymond Littles Class of 2005, Bartina Edwards Class of 2004, and Anika Hardmon Class of 2005.*



M.E. GLASS SCHOLARSHIP ENDOWMENT

The late Robert D. Glass '51, former associate justice of the Connecticut Supreme Court, established the M.E. Glass Scholarship in honor of his mother, the late Mrs. Mary E. Glass. Justice Glass, a 1951 alumnus of NCCU Law School, designed this scholarship for "deserving students who exhibited conspicuous determination by work scholarship." Justice Glass served on the Connecticut Supreme Court from 1987-1992. *2003 Recipient: Vaddrick Parker Class of 2004.*



T.C. JERVAY '77 SCHOLARSHIP ENDOWMENT

Family members and friends established the T.C. Jervay Scholarship in October 1986 to honor the memory of the late Thomas C. Jervay, Jr., a 1977 alumnus of NCCU Law School. Mr. Jervay served as the former Assistant U.S. Attorney for the Middle District of North Carolina and as a partner with the Law Firm of Henry Frye and Ronald Barbee. *2003 Recipients: Andrew Clifford Class of 2004 and Timothy Peterkin Class of 2004*

FRED ANDERSON TOYOTA SCHOLARSHIP ENDOWMENT

In 1997, the Fred Anderson Toyota dealership of North Carolina established the Fred Anderson Toyota Scholarship at the Law School. The dealership restricted the scholarship's use to tuition and books only.

NOTE: Due to the level of earnings within an endowed account and/or the award of scholarships in a previous year, the NCCU Law School may not award scholarships each year from each scholarship endowment. As earnings accumulate at levels appropriate for a gift, the Law School awards scholarships.

As the calendar year comes to a close, please remember the Law School in your charitable giving plans. Your tax-deductible gift will make a significant difference in the Law School's present operations through the New Horizons Annual Fund and future projects as earmarked in the Law School's first Capital Campaign.

Gifts to the New Horizons Annual Fund are deeply valued as these gifts provide a source of income that supports ongoing programs and services of the Law School. Essentially, Annual Fund gifts bridge the gap between the Law School's revenue and expenditures.

Also, the Law School continues to move forward in its first Capital Campaign. Funding priorities of the Law School's Capital Campaign remain:

- increasing scholarship endowments;
- strengthening and expanding academic programs;
- renovating and expanding the Albert L. Turner Law Building
- building the New Horizons Endowment, a general administration endowment.

NOTE: As a result of private gifts, the North Carolina Bond Referendum, and Title III Challenge Grant monies, the Law School has secured over 80% of the \$11.5 million budget for the Turner Building Project. **Approximately \$2 million more must be raised to complete the building project, slated to begin January 2004 and conclude within 12 to 18 months.** *Naming opportunities still exist (see listing below).* Law firms, organizations, corporations, and individuals — singularly or in partnership with others — may take advantage of naming opportunities.

As you make your gift to the Law School this year, please remember the importance of each funding need — the New Horizons Annual Fund and the Law School's first Capital Campaign. You may make your gift to either priority or you may split your gift. An envelope is included for your convenience.

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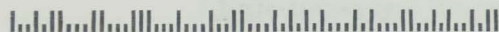
