SAMPSON ANNOUNCES RETIREMENT

Professor and former Dean, Daniel G. Sampson, has announced his retirement as a member of the faculty, effective August 1, 1984, after thirty-four years of service to the Law School. He joined the faculty in 1950. Sampson's tenure spans over three quarters of the entire history of the NCCU School of Law. Thus, Dean Sampson's presence at the Law School, as Dean and as Professor, is inextricably bound with the history of the Law School itself.

Apart from his tenure as a revered teacher - many alumni affectionately know him as "Mr. Torts" - he was the guiding spirit of the Law School as Dean from 1965-1969, as evidenced by his report in 1966. That report, "North Carolina College School of Law in the Context of Social Change", dated December 1966, was certainly instrumental in turning around a plan to "phase out" the Law School by 1974.

The Faculty of the School of Law has requested of the Chancellor and the NCCU Board of Trustees that Sampson be named "Dean and Professor Emeritus of the School of Law" upon his retirement. This request was unanimously approved. In addition, the School is working on a plan to provide an "appropriate means" to honor and recognize the many outstanding contributions Sampson has made. All alumni will be able to participate in the recognition.

"Dean Sampson's contributions are noteworthy for so much more than their longevity. His contributions are noteworthy for their evidence of his devotion, sensitivity, steadiness and strength", says the present Dean. "He has been with the Law School through critical times and his steady influence is known by alumni everywhere", according to Dean Daye. "More than that", says Daye, "he is a warm, genuine person who cares deeply about our institution and students. He will, of course, be irreplaceable. But we will find a way to keep his services on a part-time basis after his retirement for just as long as he is willing to help us."

FACULTY ACTIVITIES

Jack B. Johnson, with nine years experience in the Office of Chief Counsel, Interpretative Division as Attorney-Advisor (Tax) for the Internal Revenue Service, has been appointed Associate Professor. **Jack** joined the faculty at the start of the 1984 Spring Semester and is teaching Taxation and Advanced Taxation. He is a 1975 graduate of the Howard University School of Law and has done advanced work in Taxation of Partnerships and Intermediate Corporate Taxation in the New York University School of Law Continuing Professional Education Program. T. Mmodana Ringer, Professor and Associate Dean, has delivered a paper on Evidence at a CLE Program sponsored by the N.C. Academy of Trial Lawyers.

Gwen T. Swinson, Adjunct Professor has been named Assistant Dean at the Duke University School of Law. She is presently teaching Torts in the evening program.
