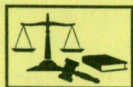

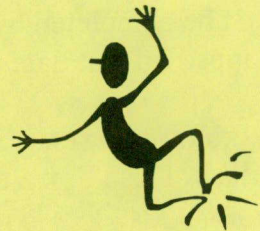

PRE-REGISTRATION INFORMATION FOR STUDENTS AND FACULTY -

For Summer 2000 and Fall Semester 2000 - March 22, 2000

Procedure for Pre-registration. 1) Pick up materials at law school - University's printed newspaper schedule, law school grid schedule, this hand-out. 2) Meet with you advisor and complete Advising Worksheet Form, signed by both advisor and advisee. Advisor will then give student PIN number, 3) Student then calls Eagleline (follow instructions in printed newspaper schedule) to complete pre-registration

Minimum Class Enrollments, Deadline for Completion of Pre-registration. Pre-registration must be completed by April 14. Any class with fewer than 10 students pre-registered may be dropped on that date.

Maximum hours. Students may register for only 16 hours without prior approval of Dean Mills or Dean Fox along with a recommendation from the individual advisor.

Repeating Classes Students who received a grade of C- or below in a first-year course must repeat that course during their second year. Students must be sure to inform their advisors if they are in that situation.

Summer School clarification:

1) Law 9270- Criminal Litigation Clinic Classroom will be offered Summer I, running May 22-June 2 and meeting MTWRF from 1-5. Pre-requisites are Criminal Procedure and Trial Practice.

2) Law 9583-Contemporary Legal Issues will be Aids and the Law.

3) Law 9012 - Business Transactions for Lawyers **WILL NOT BE TAUGHT**

4) Relational Injuries is a 3-credit course. It's course number is Law 8620 and the Call number is available on Ms. Self's door.

New Course Descriptions - Please check Law School Bulletin for descriptions of other courses

1) **Alternative Dispute Resolution Clinic** (2 credit hours): Students will receive training in mediation technique, conflict resolution, communication skills, and collaborative law from trainers at Mediation Services of Wake, Inc. and The Dispute Settlement Center of Durham and will participate as observers, and co-mediators in actual cases handled by the centers. Successful completion of all requirements will lead to certification as a volunteer mediator at the local centers.

The dates for training and mediation are being arranged by Prof. Morris. Students interested in this class **must** contact him prior to registering to fully understand the schedule commitments. Students **must** attend all training programs,

ADR is not a prerequisite, nor are students who have taken ADR foreclosed from taking ADR Clinic. Students wishing to register should speak with Professor Morris before doing so.

2) Law 9585 is the ProBono Clinic which will involve the completion of a group (2-5 students) pro bono project under the supervision of an attorney. Each group will have a choice to either present a proposal for a project or one will be provided. Upon completion of the project each group is responsible for presenting a paper explaining the project, its implementation, and its outcome. Some of the projects that may be available include assisting the Durham County District court with creation and implementation of a School Truancy Program designed to assist the District Court judges in conducting truancy hearings, and assisting various local attorneys with large pro bono projects. The course will be taught by the law school's Pro Bono Coordinator Natalie McKinney, a graduate of University of California at Berkeley, Boalt Hall law school, formerly with Moore & Van Allen and currently with the Law Offices of Dana G. Jones

3) Death Penalty Seminar - Pre-req: Crim Pro. The class will cover the comprehensive case law surrounding the Eighth Amendment death penalty jurisprudence, as well as introduce students to the advanced criminal procedure of collateral attack (post-conviction) jurisprudence. The course will be taught by Marshall Dayan who has represented death row inmates since 1988 through the North Carolina Resource Center and in private practice. He has published widely on death penalty law and is the recipient of the ACLU's Paul Green Award for his efforts to abolish the death penalty.

4) Law 9015 - Community Development will deal with issues related to efforts on the part of government, non-government and business entities to create economic opportunity in low-income communities. Classroom discussion and readings will be based on (i) theoretical concepts which help define what goals community development efforts should accomplish; (ii) issues relating to forming entities to foster community development, such as nonprofit corporations, and (iii) legal issues that arise in efforts to funnel economic development in ways to further certain social aims, such as minority set asides and the Community Reinvestment Act.

Justice Orr will review what he looks during the hiring process as well as what he expects of his clerks. His clerks will provide insight as to the application process as well as discuss the day to day duties of a judicial clerk.
