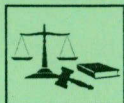

SEMESTER 2002

The ADR course offered in
the Spring Semester of 2002
is the two-hour ADR Clinic,
not the three-hour ADR
classroom course.

Students will receive an
intensive 40-hour training
program in Basic Mediation,
Arbitration, Collaborative
Law and related subjects.
The training is provided by
the staff of Carolina Dispute
Settlement Services, Inc.

(CDSS) and the law school
faculty. The training will
take place at the Law School
the week before classes
officially begin. The
training session will begin
Thursday, January 3rd and
continue through Sunday,
January 6th. The final day of
training will take place on
Saturday, February 9th.

ON EACH OF THESE
DAYS, THE SESSION
WILL BEGIN AT 8:00 A.M.
AND RUN UNTIL 5:30
P.M., WITH A BREAK
FOR LUNCH.
PUNCTUALITY AND
ATTENDANCE AT ALL
TRAINING SESSIONS IS
MANDATORY.

During the regular semester,
the class will meet for 50
minutes per week, at 1:00
p.m. on Wednesday.

Students are required to
spend no less than five
sessions in district court,
three in Wake County and
two in Durham County,
participating in at least six
mediations.

Juvenile Law Clinic. The
NCCU School of Law
Juvenile Law Clinic works
with Durham County
juveniles who are involved in
delinquency hearings, and
school administrative
hearings for long-term
suspensions. Law students
provide direct legal services
upon completion of the
instruction and training on
the North Carolina juvenile
delinquency code, Durham
County School Board policies
and procedures,
administrative procedures,
and relevant state law
pertaining to schools. Over
the semester, the classroom
component will consist of 30
to 40 hours of training and
instruction, and the field
component will consist of 60
to 70 hours. The Clinic is

offered to second semester 2Ls and all 3Ls who complete or are concurrently enrolled in the prerequisite courses (criminal law, criminal procedure, civil procedure, and trial practice). (2 credits).

Instruction and training will be conducted on January 4th, 5th, 11th, 12th, 18th, and 19th from 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Once instruction and training is completed, class time will be used to work on pending cases.
