ADR CLINIC SUMMER SCHOOL 2002

Students thinking of taking the ADR Clinic in Summer School should expect a unique and exciting education experience that requires a significant commitment of time. Please read the following description carefully to determine whether your schedule this summer can accommodate the demands of the course.

First of all, students will receive an intensive 40-hour training program in Basic Mediation Arbitration, Collaborative Law and related subjects. The training is provided by the staff of Carolina Dispute Settlement Services, Inc. (CDSS). The training will

take place Monday through Friday May 13th through May 17th at the Law School. The sessions will begin at 8:00 A.M. each day and run until 5:30 P.M. with a break for lunch.

***PUNCTUALITY AND
ATTENDANCE AT ALL
TRAINING SESSIONS IS
MANDATORY.***

The class will meet as a group for a program on advanced mediation issues, techniques and ethical problems on Wednesday, June 26th at the Law School. By that time each student is expected to have participated in several mediations, and each student will present a topic for discussion based on their own experience.

Beginning Monday, May 20th students will rotate through the District Court Mediation Program in Wake and or Durham County. Initially, students will be supervised by attorney-mediators or experienced non-attorney volunteer mediators and will act as observers or co-mediators in district court criminal matters. District Court in Wake County is held on Mondays and Fridays only. There is a morning and an afternoon session on Monday and a morning session on Friday. District Court in Durham meets Tuesday and Wednesday mornings.

Students are required to spend no less than five sessions in district court. Morning sessions of District Court begin at 9:00 AM and adjourn about 12:00 noon. After court, we will return to the office of CDSS for discussion and debriefing. Thus, students should plan to spend approximately 4½ hours, from 8:45 A.M. to about 1:00 P.M., at the morning sessions. Afternoon sessions of court begin at 2:00 P.M. and adjourn at 5:00 P.M. It is not uncommon for a mediation to extend beyond 5:00 P.M. Thus, students should plan to spend at least 3 hours, roughly from 1:45 P.M. to 6:00 P.M., at the afternoon sessions. You must complete your hours and mediations by July 26, 2002.

Any student may register for ADR Clinic. The ADR course is not a prerequisite, nor are students who have taken ADR foreclosed from taking the clinic. Enrollment is absolutely capped at 14 students. In the event of over subscription, preferences will generally be given to upper classmen, and final enrollment will be fixed no later than April 30th.

To summarize, you must be at the Law School *BY 8:00 A.M.* on May 13th -17th and attend all day, everyday. You must also spend at least

five sessions in district court, do at least 6 mediations and take lead in two of those and attend the June 26th class at the law school.
