

Tues., Nov. 12, beginning at 9:30 a.m. This annual fall event is one that the students, faculty and staff all enjoy.

The Court first started holding court at all of the Law Schools in the mid-90s, when Clifton E.
Johnson '67 was still a member. When Judge Johnson retired, he

asked his good friend Judge John Martin to make sure the tradition continued—and it has.

The panel this year consists of Judge K. Edward Greene, Judge John C. Martin and Judge Wanda G. Bryant '82. There are three cases scheduled; the cases can each last up to an hour.

The first is a state case involving sexual abuse and objections made regarding evidentiary rulings at trial. The second involves disagreements regarding contractual obligations between a plaintiff doctor and various defendant medical providers, including Community General Hospital of Thomasville, Inc. The third case involves a lawsuit brought on behalf of a decedent which contends that defendant's negligent

SCHOOL OF LAW SPOTLIGHT ... Professor Glean!

Professor Pamela Stanback Glean '68 is a native of Hillsborough, NC. She graduated from Duke University in 1977 with a bachelor's degree in economics. She received her juris doctorate in 1980, after which she entered private practice in Greensboro, NC.

In 1992, Glean returned to Durham where she served as Assistant County Attorney, and Staff Attorney for the Center for Child & Family Health. She began teaching at NCCU School of Law in 1996, and is currently a clinical supervising attorney.

While at the Law School, Glean has served as coach and advisor for the Trial Advocacy Team, a member and advisor of the Faculty Senate, and a member of the University Graduation Committee. She also teaches regularly for NITA (the National Institute of Trial Advocacy) and The Principal's Executive Program.

Professor Glean's hobbies in-

clude gardening and traveling, especially to the beach.

Professor Glean's brother A. Leon Stanback, '68 (also a Central Law grad) is a superior court judge in Durham!
